



Background: Deer Park Development LLC (applicant), is proposing a General Plan Amendment (GPA) from "Commercial Resort" (CR) to "Highway Commercial (HC), and a Zone Change from Commercial Residential Resort (CRR) to Highway Commercial (C-3), on seven parcels of land, split into two separate previously developed areas totaling approximately 13.7 acres. The first proposed amendment area is located on Needles Highway, north of the Murl Shaver substation, and is comprised of five parcels with a total area of 7.93 acres. The second amendment area is located on Needles Highway, south of the Murl Shaver substation, abutting the applicant's existing boat storage facility, with a total area of 5.8 acres.

Historically, both areas have been utilized for residential housing, but have not had tenants for many years. The buildings are abandoned and are experiencing ongoing transient nuisance problems. One parcel located east of the proposed area, will retain the CRR designation. The parcel had a residential structure that was involved in a fire and is now being cited for a public nuisance. The parcel can be redeveloped as either a commercial or residential use, but cannot be used for a cannabis facility.

In 2016, the applicant's property located south of the proposed amendment areas received a General Plan Amendment from Commercial Resort (CR) to Highway Commercial (HC) and a Zone Change from Commercial Resort Residential (CRR) to Highway Commercial (C-3), and then received Conditional Use Permits for Cannabis Facilities.

In December, 2017 the applicant received approval for eight (8) Conditional Use Permits for cannabis facilities at 320 Balboa St., replacing the existing boat and RV storage facility. The site is undergoing parcelization to create individual land/building purchase opportunities, reducing the cost to investors.

The proposed GPA designation for Highway Commercial (C-3) and a Zone Change to Highway Commercial (C-3) are considered by Deer Park to be more of an appropriate land use designation for these two areas since the surrounding area already has the same General Plan and Zoning Designation as is being requested by the applicant. The amendments will allow the applicant to expand the permittable area for cannabis facilities near the boat storage facility, as well as develop

the area north of the substation into an industrial park for businesses that support the cannabis industry.

The Planning Commission held a public hearing on the matter, taking community input from Ms. Holly Anderson, 480 McShan Lane, discussing the private water lines family members installed that are located on parcels owned by the applicant, with the applicant committing to ensuring that the existing water lines remain in the current location, or will be relocated if parcel configurations change, ensuring that whatever services they provide today will be there in the future, with work performed at his expense.

Public testimony was also taken from Mr. Donald Anderson, 480 McShan Lane, inquiring about the property owner, Deer Park Development, a holding company for development projects getting entitlements; whether the changes being requested by the applicant will negatively impact property values, as well as concern with safety and odors if cannabis facilities are permitted. The City Manager indicated that there shouldn't be any property value impacts, and that security is substantial at all of the facilities and code enforcement performs regular inspections to ensure odors are mitigated if complaints are received.

The Planning Commission voted unanimously to recommend City Council approval of both the General Plan Amendment and Zone Change.

Fiscal Impact: None.

Environmental Impact: This subject property is categorically exempt under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) under Section 15601(b), whereby it can be seen with certainty that there is no possibility that the activity in may have a significant effect on the environment, the activity is not subject to CEQA. The project site is for a General Plan Amendment and Zone Change to an existing developed area of land occupied by four metal buildings and with no proposed changes to current occupant land use.

Recommended Action: Approve Ordinance No. 615-AC approving a General Plan Amendment from a Commercial Resort (CR) designation to a Highway Commercial (HC) designation and a Zone Change from a Commercial Residential Resort (CRR) designation to a Highway Commercial (C-3) designation for the properties known as APN 0660-081-01 through 04, 0660-081-08 and 09, and 0660-091-04

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NEEDLES APPROVING A GENERAL PLAN AMENDMENT FROM "CR" COMMERCIAL RESORT TO "CH" HIGHWAY COMMERCIAL AND A ZONE CHANGE FROM "CRR" COMMERCIAL RESIDENTIAL RESORT TO "C-3" HIGHWAY COMMERCIAL FOR THE PROPERTY LOCATED ALONG NEEDLES HIGHWAY KNOWN AS APN 0660-081-01 THROUGH 04, 0660-081-08 AND 09, AND 0660-091-04

WHEREAS, Deer Park Development submitted an application requesting a General Plan Amendment from Commercial Resort (CR) to Commercial Highway (CH) and a Zone Change from Commercial Residential Resort (CRR) to Highway Commercial (C-3) for their property located along Needles Highway, north of the I-40 off-ramp; and

WHEREAS, Government Code Section 65860 requires that the General Plan designation and Zoning Code are consistent; and

WHEREAS, a public hearing notice for the Needles Planning Commission meeting was published in the Needles Desert Star on February 20, 2019, 10 days prior to said meeting, and notices were sent to property owners within a 300-foot radius of the subject property specifying the date, time and location of the public hearing; and

WHEREAS, on March 6, 2019, the Needles Planning Commission held a duly noticed and advertised public hearing to receive oral and written testimony relative to the General Plan Amendment and Zone Change; and

WHEREAS, a public hearing notice for the Needles City Council meeting was published in the Needles Desert Star on February 20, 2019, 10 days prior to said meeting, and notices were sent to property owners within a 300-foot radius of the subject property specifying the date, time and location of the public hearing for a proposed General Plan Amendment and Zone Change; and

WHEREAS, the matter was scheduled for a public hearing at the March 26, 2019 City Council meeting; and

WHEREAS, on March 26, 2019, the Needles City Council held a duly noticed and advertised public hearing to receive oral and written testimony for the proposed General Plan Amendment and Zone Change; and,

WHEREAS, Section 116.00(d) of the Needles City Code describes the findings required to approve a General Plan Amendment and Zone Change; and

WHEREAS, the Needles City Council has sufficiently considered all testimony and any documentary evidence presented to them in order to make the following determination.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Needles as follows:

SECTION 1. The City Council HEREBY FINDS AND DETERMINES that this subject site is categorically exempt under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) under Section 15601(b), whereby it can be seen with certainty that there that there is no possibility that the activity in question may have a significant effect on the environment, the activity is not subject to CEQA. The project area for the General Plan Amendment and Zone Change is an existing developed area of land occupied by residential structures and accessory buildings.

<u>SECTION 2</u>. The City Council HEREBY FINDS AND DETERMINES, with reports and findings, that facts do exist to approve a General Plan Amendment.

A. The project is consistent with the General Plan

FINDING: The proposed General Plan Amendment from Commercial Resort (CR) to Highway Commercial (CH) for the project area will be consistent with the elements, goals and policies of the General Plan and that no effects of inconsistency can be determined with the proposed General Plan Amendment onto surrounding land uses.

B. Approval of the Amendment will not create conditions materially detrimental to the public health, safety and general welfare

FINDING: Approval of the proposed General Plan Amendment will not create conditions materially detrimental to public health, safety and general welfare in that the proposed change will continue the expansion of the Highway Commercial area in North Needles that has seen growth from the permitting of cannabis facilities and re-develop the blighted residential area that continues to experience problems with transient nuisance problems.

C. The new designation is compatible with the land use designations on adjacent properties.

FINDING: The General Plan Amendment will allow the creation of an industrial park that allows the permitting of cannabis facilities, as well as ancillary businesses that support the industry. Other types of commercial uses in the vicinity of the proposed amendment area include a truck repair facility and boat and RV storage facility. A parcel located east of the area being proposed for the change in designation, will maintain the CRR zoning designation. At one time the parcel had a residential structure, but has experienced a fire and now is being cited for a public nuisance. The parcel can be used for either commercial or residential uses, but cannot be used for a cannabis facility.

D. Approval of the Amendment is warranted because the general conditions of the property have substantially changed since the existing designation was imposed.

Residential uses in the vicinity of the proposed amendment area have been abandoned for many years and continue to experience ongoing transient nuisance problems. The areas south and west of the proposed amendment area are experiencing significant growth through the permitting of cannabis facilities.

SECTION 3. The City Council HEREBY FINDS AND DETERMINES, with reports and findings, that facts do exist to approve a Zone Change, according to the criteria specified in Section 116.00(d) of the Needles City Code:

A. An explanation of the relationship to the General Plan and any applicable specific Plan.

FINDING: The site is designated as CR in the General Plan with no specific plan that has been adopted in this area. Currently, the property is zoned CRR and the relationship between the General Plan and Zoning designations are consistent. If approved, the land use designation (CH) and zoning (C-3) would be consistent.

B. Consideration of the effect of the proposal on the housing needs of the region balanced against the public service needs of the city residents and the fiscal and environmental resources available.

FINDING: The proposed Zone Change to Highway Commercial (C-3) will not create a significant imbalance or deficit in the housing needs for the City of Needles as forecasted by the Southern California Associate of Government's (SCAG) Regional Housing Needs Assessment (RHNA), as SCAG has identified 181 additional residences required in the City of Needles based on population, and that the City has a number of properties zoned for residential development that can fulfill this need.

<u>SECTION 4</u>. The City Council HEREBY FINDS AND DETERMINES that facts do exist to approve **ORDINANCE 615-AC with conditions**:

- 1) Applicant to ensure that existing private water lines located on his property(s) and attached to structures on or near his property remain in place and functional or are relocated due to lot reconfigurations and continue to provide the same services that exist as of this date.
- 2) Applicant to provide a 20' wide paved easement from Needles Highway, across the property known as APN 0660-081-04 to the property line of the parcel known as APN 0660-081-05

SECTION 5. The City Council HEREBY APPROVES ORDINANCE 615-AC, approving a General Plan Amendment from a Commercial Resort (CR) designation to a Highway Commercial (CH) designation and a proposed Zone Change from a Commercial Residential Resort (CRR) designation to a Highway Commercial (C-3) designation for the property known as 0660-081-01 through 04, 0660-081-08 and 09, and 0660-091-04

Hi Cindy,

Just in case someone wants to know who struggled for almost a year to get the dredge in place to straighten out the river before it took out all of Indian Village, and then the city of Needles. That man was my father, Judge James A. Barnes. He passed away Christmas evening of 1994.

My mother (Ethel Barnes) and I almost drowned in that storm when the river overflowed it's banks, then rose what had to be 15 to 20 feet UP the hill, and then about 100 level feet into our home, cornering my mother and I in our dining room in waist high water. My mother couldn't swim and was freaking out!

At 9 years old I was a great swimmer but 2 of the largest Mojave Indians drowned that day (both good swimmers). In addition to that, the heavy movement of water from the distant hills Southwest of Indian Village scooped the entire Mojave cremation cemetery up, and sent it out the lagoon entrance and down the river.

Thanks to my father, Needles has never experienced anything like that flood again since the new river bank was put in place to protect Indian Village, the properties now on the West side of the lagoon, and the city of Needles. That new river bank is what now forms the West Bank of the river (that used to be in front of our home). Needless to say, if that major river repair had not been made, much (if not all) of Needles might not be here today. Our dangerous river frontage was replaced by by the Needles Lagoon, and moved the river far to the East where it is today.

Needless to say, the Needles Lagoon should have been named after my father. The Bureau of Reclamation drug it's feet about fixing the problem. Fortunately, my father went to college with a high powered state politician and the 2 of them refused to get off the backs of the slackers. Dad couldn't save Mom and I the day of the flood because he was at work that day and the high flood water cut him off from getting home. However, He vowed that day to save us from any future floods, EVER!!!

The only reason I'm alive today must be because God wanted me to live to tell this story. When the water got up to our necks in the house, the sun suddenly burst through the darkness, and the water stopped flowing from the hills behind our house. It was finally over!

Since I'm the last living signer of The Boundary Line Agreement I feel obligated to protect the land that Ron Kemper wants to destroy. That land was meant to be filled with housing, boating events, boat storage and entertainment. That's why the current zoning should most definitely stay in place. Without it, Needles will have no room to grow on the river. Jack Smith Park may be nice, but it is puny compared to the Needles Lagoon.

Just thought I should explain the history behind my desire to keep the zoning as it is on 6 of Ron Kemper's properties (in case any Planning Commission members want to know). One of his parcels (APN 0660-091-04-0000) is on the West side of River Road, however, so that one parcel would be OK for marijuana usage, but not the other 6 parcels.

I forgot that the current generation may not know the history of the Needles Lagoon so you might want to give them a copy of this email also.

Needles Planning Commission:

I just received a legal notice of your March 5, 2019 Planning Commission meeting with regard to Ron Kemper's effort to rezone 7 of his west side parcels: APNs 0660-081-01, 0660-081-02, 0660-081-03, 0660-081-04, 0660-081-08, 0660-081-09 and 0660-091-04.

I'm the Trustee for The PGB Trust that owns Parcel No. 0660-081-05-0000. It is one of the five parcels the original owner sold back before my family bought Parcel 5 in 1950. The owner provided a public roadway through the tract that still exists as easements. Each parcel owner was given easement rights so they could access their parcel. The public roadway is shown on most land maps under the name of McShan Lane. It branches off from River Road in a Northeast direction in the form of a Y.

Problem #1:

<u>Unprovoked</u>, Ron Kemper is intending to destroy McShan Lane because he has now purchased 4 of the 5 parcels that were given the right to use McShan Lane for as long as their parcel exists. He thinks he has the right to do so because he owns all the parcels surrounding ours. However, our parcel will be landlocked if McShan Lane is destroyed because there will be no way to access our parcel. However, Mr. Kemper couldn't care less about our rights because he wants to use his land to grow/process Marijuana. He wants us to stay away from his property, AND McShan Lane.

Ron Kemper has now locked our family out of their own property. This can be verified with Bernie Hatz, the Needles Code Enforcer. He had to make arrangements with Mr. Kemper for my helpers to clear our parcel of heavy weed growth. Mr. Kemper gave me until April 1st to do the clearance and then our right to use the easement road (McShan Lane) will be permanently over because he plans to grade it into oblivion.

Problem #2:

My family was a major donor of the land in State Parcel No. 0660-081-06-0000 along with a sizable amount of legal fees and other costs. I think I must be the only surviving signer of The Boundary Line Agreement that is the end result of the land donations and should be recorded on most of the parcels that border the Needles Lagoon.

The reason my family donated their property to the State of Calfornia (thereafter leased to Fish and Game), was to keep the Needles Lagoon "WET". The SOLE purpose of making that donation was to maintain the Needles

Lagoon for the benefit of the City of Needles, and ALL of it's residents. Most of the adjacent neighbors also donated various amounts of money to accomplish our joint goal. Although Fish and Game was required to maintain the water level in the lagoon it has failed to do so. The massive weed collection all over the dry lagoon bottom attests to their worth. They've literally turned the lagoon into a gigantic fire hazard (that burned our family home down in June of 2004).

The WEST side of River Road should be used for marijuana projects, as opposed to the East side, because it is less apt to destroy the value of the river land and the lagoon land. Adjoining property owners will be able to buy back that land if the state decides to sell it in the future.

There is no other river frontage in Needles that can begin to compare to the Needles Lagoon. Without that lagoon land, Needles will never be anything other than a weed farm filled with giant warehouses, electric transformers and a severe water shortage. Who would want to live there?

The EAST side of River Road should be reserved for the eventual revival of the Needles Lagoon (something Mr. Kemper has never experienced). Only old timers, like myself, know the value of the Needles Lagoon. That lagoon is what made Needles so prosperous back in the fifties, sixties, seventies and eighties, until a MASSIVE storm released a massive amount of land that shifted into the mouth of the lagoon. Shortly thereafter, the flood problem was rechanneled to keep that from ever happening again. However, the Bureau of Reclamation dredge never returned to dredge out the entrance of the lagoon to make it useable again. It's consistently been one excuse after another. The city of Needles needs to stop taking "not now" for an answer.

Problem #3:

If you should decide to give in to Mr. Kemper's demands to change the zoning on his parcels, please tell him you will make the change if he agrees (IN WRITING) to leave McShan Lane INTACT! My family wants to rebuild our family home on Parcel 5, but we need to have McShan Lane in order to do so, and to be able to live there again. That particular area is meant for homes, water sports, and entertainment - - - not for marijuana.

WHEREAS, the lands involved in this Agreement ("Subject Property") are situated in San Bernardino County; and

WHEREAS, the State, upon being admitted to the Union in 1850, and by virtue of its sovereignty, received title to the bed of the Colorado River lying westerly of the middle of the channel to the ordinary high water mark (OHWM), subject to the public trust for commerce, navigation, fisheries, recreation and preservation of land its natural state; and

WHEREAS, in the area involved in this Agreement, a portion of the bed of the Colorado River has been abandoned ("abandoned riverbed") as a result of artificial rechannelization efforts in 1951 and consequently the boundary between the uplands and State sovereign lands, the OHWM has become fixed; and

WHEREAS, the easterly boundary of the State's sovereign claim, the middle of the channel, is not determined by this Agreement and this Agreement is without prejudice to the parties to subsequently litigate or determine it; and

whereas, uncertainty exists as to the precise last natural location of the abandoned riverbed and of the OHWM and the Ordinary Low Water Mark (OLWM) of the abandoned riverbed; and

WHEREAS, some of the Private Parties have initiated quiet title and declaratory relief litigation to establish the rights of the parties with respect to the subject property.

Article 1. Fixed Boundary Line

- time the common boundary ("Boundary Line") dividing the upland interests of the Private Parties from the sovereign interests of the State in the bed of the Colorado River lying westerly of the middle of the channel. The Boundary Line is more particularly described in Exhibit A and depicted on Exhibit B and is the best representation available to the parties of the OHWM prior to 1951.
- 1.2 The parties agree, for the purpose of establishing the Boundary Line, that the last natural location of the OHWM of the abandoned riverbed, as described in Exhibit A, is in the same location as the last natural location of the OLWM of the abandoned riverbed.

- 1.3 The Boundary Line represents a reasonable and good faith effort of both the Private Parties and the State to locate the last natural location of the OHWM and OLWM of the abandoned riverbed.
- 1.4 The parties agree that the Boundary Line shall constitute the agreed, true, common boundary between the State's sovereign interest in the abandoned riverbed lying westerly of the middle of the channel and the Private Parties' interest in the uplands, as described in Exhibit A and depicted on Exhibit B, and including but not limited to any fee or easement interest the parties may have between the OHWM and the OLWM.
 - 1.5 The Boundary Line is intended to be, and it shall

accepted by the State on the property within 10 days after receiving written notice from the State that an offer has been accepted. The notice of the offer shall be sent to the respective attorneys for the Private Parties listed on the signature page of this Agreement and shall include all the specific terms of the conditionally accepted offer.

- (c) If the Private Parties fail to exercise their right of first refusal they shall have no further rights with respect to the subject property pursuant to this Agreement.
- (d) The right of first offer and the right of first refusal shall extend to that portion of the abandoned riverbed immediately adjacent to each property owner's parcel, determined by extending each owner's parcel lines east, to the then-current western bank of the Colorado River.

Article 3. <u>Litigation</u>

- 3.1 This Agreement constitutes a settlement of, and is intended to settle all differences among the parties relating to, the Boundary Line described in Exhibits A and ownership to the western half of the abandoned riverbed. It will be confirmed by a stipulated judgment with respect to the Declaratory Relief Cause Action in Zimmerer v. McShan. A copy of the stipulated judgment is attached hereto as Exhibit C.
- 3.2 The Quiet Title cause of action in Zimmerer v.

 prejudice. However, nothing herein will preclude any party from

- 4.9 This Agreement shall become effective upon its execution by the parties and recordation as provided herein. This Agreement shall by binding on the Private Parties who execute it and regardless of whether it is executed by all the Private Parties. Nothing herein is intended to limit or define the rights of the State as against those Private Parties who fail to sign this Agreement.
- 4.10 All parties shall bear their own attorneys' fees and costs with respect to this Agreement and the pending litigation discussed in Article 3 of this Agreement.
- 4.11 This Agreement shall be governed by and interpreted according to the laws of the State of California.
- 4.12 Should an action be instituted to interpret or enforce the provisions of this Agreement, the prevailing party shall be entitled to recover reasonable attorneys' fee and costs.
- 4.13 Any action to interpret or enforce this Agreement shall be brought in the County of San Bernardino, California.

2. DESCRIPTION OF OFFER

2.1 SUMMARY OF WORK

The purposes of this verification exercise are, by review of objective evidence, to independently verify that the submitted emissions data reports are:

- · Free of material misstatement; and
- In full conformance with the requirements of the Regulation.

Lincus' verification team follows a very well defined and tested approach to achieve these objectives. Here is the detailed description of various tasks involved in this analysis:

Task 1: COI/NOVS Evaluation – Prior to beginning any verification project, *Lincus* conducts an evaluation to identify any potential conflicts of interest (COI) as per the guidelines provided in the regulation section 95133. The *Operator* may be asked to provide emissions information to *Lincus* in order to proceed with this evaluation. Once *Lincus*' internal review is completed and approved for the verification services, *Lincus* will assign a Lead Verifier to coordinate various verification activities. The Lead Verifier will then select other verification team members based on their familiarity with the technical operations of similar type of facilities. The lead verifier will have operational control over the verification team and will be the primary point of contact for all verification activities. After completion of internal COI evaluation, *Lincus* will submit a Conflict of Interest (COI) and a Notice of Verification Service (NOVS) form to ARB for each facility to be verified. After CARB approves the COI and NOVS, Lincus will begin verification services for the *Operator*.

Task 2: Project Kickoff and Coordination – After receiving ARB's approval, a kick-off meeting (or a conference call) with the *Operator* will be held to discuss verification activities, ARB's requirements, verification schedule, clearance issues, and other applicable project details. *Lincus* will also request a point-of-contact at the site to touch base and follow up for information during the course of the project (if necessary). Copies of emissions related information for the verification year, including a copy of the certified emissions report submitted to ARB, will also be requested to develop a complete analysis of the facility.

Task 3: Verification Plan Development – Once the information outlined in Task 2 is obtained, Lincus will analyze the data in concert with information regarding the Operator's operation to formally document the verification plan. The verification plan will include dates of proposed meetings and site visits; list of personnel to be interviewed; list and types of document and data reviews; and expected date for completing verification services

Task 4: On-Site Verification – Once the verification plan is complete and agreed upon, a site visit will be made to the facility to verify the facility's emission sources, data management systems, and to interview personnel associated with their GHG emission program. Facility visits for each facility undergoing full verification are mandatory per AB 32 regulations. During the site visit, Lincus will inspect facility operations, emissions-related documentation, data management systems, metering equipment calibration records, and other areas. This will include interviews with key personnel involved in recording, storing, managing, and generating reports related to emissions reporting. Every effort will be made to schedule interviews with key personnel to minimize disruption to facility operations. Depending upon the pre-site visit data provided by the facility, Lincus verifiers will survey the facility for data gathering, inspection and interview of



various facility personnel. Project status updates and follow up site visits (if necessary) will be coordinated through the Lincus Lead Verifier assigned to that facility.

Task 5: Sampling Plan Development – In this task, verification team will develop a data sampling plan based on a strategic analysis developed from document reviews and interviews during the site visit. The sampling plan will be created to assess the likely nature, scale and complexity of the verification services. The sampling plan will include:

- Ranking of all emission sources by magnitude on a CO₂e (Carbon Dioxide equivalent) basis;
- 2. Ranking of emission sources with the largest calculation uncertainty
- 3. Qualitative description of uncertainty risk assessment of
 - Data processing and tracking
 - Emission calculations
 - Data reporting
 - · Management policies or practices in developing emission data reports

Task 6: Compliance Assessment – Based on the sampling plan, the verification team will conduct a thorough review of the Operator's calculation data to verify compliance with the regulation. The verification team will also verify the Operator's compliance with other non-data driven portions of the regulation as specified in regulation section 95103 to 95109. In essence, the verification team will verify that submitted emission data report is "free of material misstatement" and is in "full conformance with the requirements of regulation". In some cases verification team may re-create a part of the emission calculations to verify its accuracy. If required, the lead verifier may request for additional documentations and/or explanations. If any inconsistencies are found in the emission data report, the verification team will communicate them to the *Operator* in a language which cannot be constituted as consulting. In some cases, it may be recommended to contact the relevant ARB authority.

Task 7: Internal Quality Control – Following the completion of the compliance assessment process, and a recommendation by the verification team, all documentation will be forwarded to an Internal Lead Verifier. The task of the Internal Lead Verifier is to check that all procedures have been followed and all conclusions are justified. The Internal Lead Verifier will either accept or reject the recommendation made by the verification team.

Task 8: Verification Report & Verification Opinion – As an outcome of the verification process, *Lincus* will provide to the *Operator*, a detailed verification report. The verification report will include the verification plan, the detailed comparison of the data checks with the submitted emission data report, the log of issues identified in the course of verification activities and their resolution, and any qualifying comments on findings during verification services. The verification team will also provide a verification opinion to the *Operator*. In the event of adverse verification opinion, the *Operator* will be provided at least ten working days to modify the emission data report to correct any material misstatement or nonconformance found by the verification team. At the expiry of this period, *Lincus* will provide a modified report and verification opinion to ARB and the *Operator*. In some cases, an exit meeting can be scheduled to explain the verification findings to the *Operator*.



2.2 PROJECT SCHEDULE

Lincus proposes to complete the verification activities anywhere between 6-8 weeks after written acceptance of this proposal and/or submission of the 2018 Greenhouse Gas emissions report to the California Air Resources Board (whichever is later). The table below shows a tentative timeframe for each task to be followed for this verification services. Please note that the COI/NOVS can be completed before the submission of the annual Greenhouse Gas Emissions report.

ORDINANCE NO. 614-AC

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NEEDLES, CALIFORNIA, AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. 481-AC AND ORDINANCE NO. 531-AC, BOTH OF WHICH RELATE TO AN EXCLUSIVE FRANCHISE AGREEMENT WITH ALLIED WASTE TRANSPORTATION, INC. FOR THE COLLECTION AND HANDLING OF SOLID WASTE

WHEREAS, by way of Ordinance No. 481-AC – "An Ordinance of the City Council of the City of Needles, California approving an exclusive franchise agreement between the City of Needles and Allied Waste Transportation, Inc. for the collection and handling of solid waste" ("Ordinance No. 481"), the City Council approved an exclusive franchise agreement between the City of Needles, a California Municipal corporation (the "CITY") and Allied Waste Transportation, Inc., a Delaware corporation ("CONTRACTOR") for the collection and handling of solid waste within the CITY (the "Original Franchise Agreement"); and

WHEREAS, the Original Franchise Agreement was amended by Ordinance No. 531-AC – "An Ordinance of the City Council of the City of Needles, California, Amending Ordinance No. 481-AC - An Ordinance of the City Council of the City of Needles, California approving an exclusive franchise agreement between the City of Needles and Allied Waste Transportation, Inc. for the collection and handling of solid waste" (the "First Amendment"); and

WHEREAS, the Original Franchise Agreement and First Amendment were amended by Ordinance No. 601-AC – "An Ordinance of the City Council of the City of Needles, California, Amending Ordinance No. 481-AC and Ordinance No. 531-ac, both of which relate to an exclusive franchise agreement with republic services (Allied Waste Transportation, Inc.) for the collection and handling of solid waste" (the "Second Amendment") (together with the First Amendment and the Original Franchise Agreement, the "Exclusive Franchise Agreement"); and

WHEREAS, CITY and CONTRACTOR desire to extend the term of the Exclusive Franchise Agreement through July 1, 2028, with two additional, five-year options to extend the term of the Exclusive Franchise Agreement; and

WHEREAS, CITY and CONTRACTOR desire to have the CONTRACTOR provide organic waste recycling services toward the CITY'S compliance with the State of California's Assembly Bill 1826; and

WHEREAS, CITY and CONTRACTOR desire to make certain additional changes to the Exclusive Franchise Agreement as set out in this Ordinance.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NEEDLES, DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

The CITY and CONTRACTOR agree to further amend the Exclusive Franchise Agreement for the collection and handling of solid waste as follows:

- Term. The parties agree to extend the term of the Exclusive Franchise Agreement through July 1, 2028 (the "Third Extended Term"). Thereafter, the Exclusive Franchise Agreement may be renewed for two successive five-year terms upon the mutual consent of the CITY and the CONTRACTOR. This Section 1 shall have retroactive effect, as if the Second Extended Term never expired.
- 2. <u>Contractor Rate.</u> The rates for all services rendered pursuant to the Exclusive Franchise Agreement shall be as shown on <u>Exhibit A</u> attached hereto, subject to the rate adjustments and additional fees, costs, and other charges as set forth in the Exclusive Franchise Agreement. The rates shown on <u>Exhibit A</u> shall become effective on the Effective Date, as that term is defined below.
- 3. <u>Annual Rate Adjustments.</u> The parties agree that Section 8(d) of the Exclusive Franchise Agreement shall be replaced in its entirety with the following:

An annual rate adjustment will take effect on January 1st of each year based on the prior year's rates, commencing in 2020, in an amount equal to the percentage increase in the Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers (Water, Sewer and Trash Collection Services) U.S. City Average, as published by the United States Department of Labor, Bureau of Statistics (the "CPI"). For the CPI calculation, rates will be adjusted using the period of Nov 1st to Oct 31st of the prior year.

4. <u>Organic Waste Recycling Services.</u> The parties agree that the following definitions be added to Section 1 as follows:

Organic Waste means food waste, green waste, landscape and pruning waste, nonhazardous wood waste, and food-soiled paper waste that is mixed in with food waste.

Organic Waste Recycling Services means the collection, transport, and processing of Organic Waste.

Organic Waste Recycling Services Customer means (i) Commercial Premises that are required by applicable law (including, but not limited to State of California AB 1826 (Chesbro)) to arrange for organic waste recycling service; and (ii) any Customer or public entity that requests Organic Waste Recycling Services.

The parties further agree that Section 2 of the Exclusive Franchise Agreement shall be replaced in its entirety with the following:

CITY grants to CONTRACTOR during the term of this Agreement the exclusive right and privilege (except to the extent that sale or donation of Recyclable Materials is permitted under this Agreement) to collect and transport to a CONTRACTOR selected Disposal Facility (or in the case of Recyclable Materials or Organic Waste, to a CONTRACTOR selected Processing Facility), Refuse, Recyclable Material, Construction Waste, and Organic Waste, all exclusive of Hazardous and Special Waste, produced, generated, kept and/or accumulated

within CITY limits as those limits may exist at any time during the term of this Agreement.

The parties further agree that Section 3(a) & (b) of the Exclusive Franchise Agreement shall be replaced in its entirety with the following:

- a. Franchise Fee. In consideration of this Agreement and the permit and franchise given CONTRACTOR under this Agreement, CONTRACTOR shall pay to CITY as an administration and franchise fee a sum equal to twelve percent (12.0%) of all sums collected by City on behalf of CONTRACTOR or Affiliated Companies, or directly collected by CONTRACTOR or Affiliated Companies pursuant to this Agreement for each annual period, exclusive of (a) payments received by CONTRACTOR or Affiliated Companies from the sale of Recyclable Material; and (b) revenue obtained from the sale of Organic Waste and/or Organic Waste Recycling Services; but including any moneys received from governmental agencies, including CITY ("Franchise Fee"). CITY may adjust the Franchise Fee from time to time, provided that if CITY increases the Franchise Fee, CITY shall increase the CONTRACTOR'S rates by the amount necessary to pass through the increase in the Franchise Fee.
- b. Billing Fee. In addition to the Franchise Fee, CONTRACTOR shall pay the direct and indirect costs incurred by CITY in maintaining billing operations for CONTRACTOR's Customers within the CITY, as described in Section 8 herein (the "Billing Charge"). The initial Billing Charge shall be a sum equal to twelve percent (12.0%) of all sums collected by City on behalf of CONTRACTOR or Affiliated Companies pursuant to this Agreement for each annual period, including any moneys received from governmental agencies, including CITY, but excluding sums collected for the sale of Organic Waste Recycling Services. CITY may adjust the Billing Charge as necessary to reflect changes in CITY's costs by providing written notice CONTRACTOR of the revised Billing Charge amount, provided that if CITY increases the Billing Charge, CITY shall increase its rates by the amount necessary to pass through the increase in the Billing Charge. The Franchise Fee and Billing Charge shall be calculated against gross revenues simultaneously, so that both the Franchise Fee and Billing Charge are calculated before deduction of either the Franchise Fee or Billing Charge. CONTRACTOR understands and acknowledges that CITY is providing billing services under contract, and that CITY will not be responsible for amounts that are billed but not collected.

The parties further agree that Section 6(h) shall be inserted as follows:

 At a date to be determined by CITY and CONTRACTOR and with a minimum of one hundred and eighty (180) days' notice to CONTRACTOR, CONTRACTOR shall provide Organic Waste Recycling Services within the CITY to Organic Waste Recycling Services Customers. CONTRACTOR shall collect the Organic Waste that has been placed, kept, or accumulated in containers provided by CONTRACTOR specifically for the collection Organic Waste once per week. CONTRACTOR shall bill the CITY for Organic Waste Recycling Services at the rates set forth in Exhibit B, attached hereto. CONTRACTOR shall make available additional Containers to any Organic Waste Recycling Customer who requests additional Containers at rates set forth in Exhibit B.

- 2. CONTRACTOR and CITY agree that it is in the best interest of Organic Waste Recycling Customers to limit the costs of processing Organic Waste to the extent reasonably feasible. CONTRACTOR and CITY agree to work together in good faith to create the potential for CONTRACTOR to open an Organic Waste processing facility in or within ten miles of the CITY, or to develop another reasonable alternative to reduce the costs of processing Organic Waste in the City. CONTRACTOR and CITY further agree at a later date to negotiate in good faith the terms and conditions that will determine the feasibility of opening of such facility or reasonable alternative, including but not limited to the facility's permitting, design, construction, operation, and Organic Waste processing fees.
- 3. After January 1, 2020, in the event of (i) a change of law that materially increases or decreases CONTRACTOR'S cost of providing Organic Waste Recycling Services; (ii) the opening or closing of an Organic Waste processing facility operated by the CITY, CONTRACTOR, or affiliate of CONTRACTOR within ten miles of the CITY; (iii) an annual change in the number of Organic Waste Recycling Customers in the City, or in the tons of Organic Waste handled by CONTRACTOR in the City, of plus or minus 50% over a 1-year period, or plus or minus 60% over a rolling 3-year period; or (iv) the party's development/negotiation of another reasonably feasible alternative for processing Organic Waste, the parties agree to negotiate in good faith to adjust the rates set forth in Exhibit B.
- 5. Additional Terms for Recycling Services. In order to ensure continued compliance with AB32 and AB341, and to increase diversion of Solid Waste, CONTRACTOR shall provide collection services for Recyclable Material to all Commercial Premises that generate more than four cubic yards of commercial solid waste per week and all Multi-Unit Residential Premises of five units or more at the rates set forth in <u>Exhibit A</u> hereto beginning on a date to be mutually determined by CITY and CONTRACTOR in good faith.

The parties further agree that Section 6(d)(iii) shall be inserted as follows:

<u>Specifications for all Recyclable Materials</u>. Recyclable Materials shall comply with any and all written specifications provided by CONTRACTOR in order to meet quality thresholds for commodity markets and be free of contamination. To the extent any type of Recyclable Material received within the CITY is rejected

by the recycling facility because it does not meet the CONTRACTOR's written specifications, CONTRACTOR will notify the CITY and the CITY may in its discretion arrange for the Recyclable Materials to be disposed of by a third party reasonable and actual out-of-pocket costs incurred by CONTRACTOR due to Recyclable Materials not meeting CONTRACTOR's written specifications and upon CONTRACTOR's proof thereof to CITY, including CONTRACTOR's out-of-pocket costs to transport and dispose of the materials elsewhere. If market conditions develop that limit or inhibit CONTRACTOR from selling some or all of the Recyclable Materials, CONTRACTOR may (i) suspend or discontinue any or all Recycling services, or (ii) dispose of the Recyclable Materials in a landfill and update (subject to the CITY's prior written consent, which shall not be unreasonably withheld, conditioned, or delayed) the CITY's rates accordingly. To the extent market conditions for Recyclable Materials creates improved demand for said Materials, either CONTRACTOR or CITY may re-open negotiations regarding rates charged by CONTRACTOR relating to collection and disposal of Recyclable Materials.

6. On-Demand Residential Bulk Household Waste Curbside Collection. The Parties agree that Section 7(a) shall be replaced in its entirety with the following:

Not less than six (6) times a year, each Residential Customer shall be entitled to place an unlimited number of Bulk Household Waste for curbside pickup at no additional charge to the Customer or City. A Residential Customer who wishes to place Bulk Household Waste for collection shall contact Contractor at least forty-eight (48) hours prior to the scheduled pickup to inform CONTRACTOR that Bulk Household Waste pickup is requested and the number and type of Bulk Household Waste items to be picked up.

- 7. <u>City Facilities and Community Clean-ups.</u> The Parties agree that Section 7(b) shall be replaced in its entirety with the following:
 - b. City Facilities And Community Clean-ups

CONTRACTOR shall, upon written request by CITY, provide Front-Loading Bins and related collection, transportation and disposal services at the CITY Facilities described on Exhibit C as frequently as requested by CITY. CONTRACTOR shall, upon written request of CITY, provide up to twenty (20) Roll-Off Bins at any CITY Facility designated by CITY and shall provide related collection, transportation and disposal services for the Roll-Off Bins as requested by CITY. The number and location of the Front-Loading Bins and the location of the Roll-Off Bins shall be changed by CONTRACTOR upon receipt of written notice from the City Manager or his designee regarding such changes.

In addition to use for CITY Facilities, CITY will designate not more than one of the roll-off bins at a City-designated location (provided appropriate environmental permitting can be obtained and use for the following purpose complies with all applicable laws) for residential disposal of bulk items. This designated location, at the City's sole expense, shall be guarded, maintained and protected at all times in a manner sufficient to prevent the disposal of Hazardous Waste, including household Hazardous Waste, in the roll-off bin. At a minimum, such protection includes a staff person supervising the disposal of items and waste into the roll-off bins during the hours that the designated location is open, and an adequate fence with locked gate sufficiently far from the roll-off bin so as to not allow items to be thrown in the bin from beyond the fence when the location is not open to the public.

In addition to use at CITY Facilities, the City may designate roll-off bins for community clean-up events where a roll-off bin is placed by CONTRACTOR in a different residential zone for residents to bring bulk items once every quarter (maximum 4 clean-ups per year). Each clean-up will last no more than 8 hours to ensure that Hazardous Waste, including household Hazardous Waste, is not placed in the roll-off bins.

The CITY may amend <u>Exhibit C</u> by adding or deleting CITY Facilities upon written notice to CONTRACTOR. CITY shall not be required to make payments to CONTRACTOR for such provision and service.

8. <u>Collection Equipment.</u> The Parties agree that the following provision shall be added to the end of Section 9:

To further enhance recycling programs, and with the goal of reducing contamination of recycling containers, no later than sixty (60) after the execution of this agreement for the Third Extended Term , CONTRACTOR shall ensure that all Commercial Premises Recycling Container lids will be educational lids describing what Recyclable Materials are to be placed in the Recycling Containers and what Solid Waste is not to be placed in Recycling Containers. The current Recycling Containers for Commercial Premises will either receive new lids, or be replaced with new Recycling Containers with the educational lids. Any new Commercial Premises account will receive Recycling Containers with the educational lid. Over the period of the Exclusive Franchise Agreement, Residential Premises Recycling Containers that require replacement will receive Recycling Containers with educational lids.

- 9. <u>Capitalized Terms/Conflict</u>. Capitalized terms used but not otherwise defined in this Ordinance shall have the meanings assigned to them in the Exclusive Franchise Agreement. In the case of a conflict in meaning between the Exclusive Franchise Agreement and this Ordinance, this Ordinance shall prevail.
- Continuing Effect. Except as expressly modified or amended by this Ordinance, all terms and provisions of the Exclusive Franchise Agreement shall remain in full force and effect.

11. CONTRACTOR'S Acceptance. Acceptance of this Ordinance shall be reflected by CONTRACTOR'S execution of Attachment A – Written Acceptance of "Ordinance of the City Council of the City of Needles, California, Amending Ordinance No. 481-AC and Ordinance No. 531-AC, both of which relate to an exclusive franchise Agreement with Allied Waste Transportation, Inc. for the Collection and Handling of Solid Waste". This Ordinance shall be accepted by CONTRACTOR within thirty days after passage of the Ordinance, and shall be effective upon the date of execution on behalf of CONTRACTOR.

	At the last City Council meeting to containers at the NAT stops. ons:		
1) There are 32 bus stops on the NAT route, 17 of which currently have shade structures in-place. Historically, we've never had issues/complaints about trash in and around the bus stop areas nor have the drivers reported trash being left behind. According to NAT staff, passengers use the provided trash cans on the bus on boarding (occasionally there'll be a paper cup/can left on the bench but that's infrequent). Placement of onsite containers could encourage individuals to "dig" for cigarette butts, cans, etc., possibly causing more trash around the stop than the occasional cup/can left behind. 2) At a minimum, weekly rounds would have to be scheduled for the city crews to empty the trash containers and clean up around the stops. This time is estimated at two hours per week (for one collection) plus cost of fuel & vehicle. 3) Design of the shade structures allows for handicapped access which cannot be impeded so containers would have to be located outside the structure itself. 4) Cost of purchasing trash containers ranges from \$200 to \$1,000+ each depending on type, style, etc. It is unknown at this time if State Transit Assistance (STA) funding can be used for these purchases but the city would still have the ongoing responsibility of maintaining/emptying them once placed.

C. LP-gas cooking devices having an LP-gas container with a water capacity not greater than 2 ½ pounds. Containers shall not be manifolded together to increase capacity.

- D. Cooking devices heated solely using a catalytic heating element with no flame production.
- A Barbecue Pit shall not be kindled or maintained within 20 feet of a structure or combustible materials.
- (h) All Open Fires shall be constantly attended by a responsible adult, 18 years of age or older, until the fire is completely extinguished. A minimum of one portable fire extinguisher complying with Section 906 with a minimum 4-A rating or other approved on-site fire-extinguishing equipment such as dirt or sand with a shovel, water barrel, hose attached to a working water source, or water truck, shall be available for immediate utilization.
- (i) Ash and Ember Disposal. Ashes and embers from any open fire, barbecue or fireplace shall be placed only in a covered metal or other non-combustible container after being thoroughly cooled with water. At no time shall ashes or embers be deposited in the trash or on the ground, or placed on a combustible surface until it is confirmed that the ashes or embers are no longer hot to the touch.

27. Explosives, Fireworks, Pyrotechnics, Rockets and Rocket Motors.

- (a) It shall be unlawful for any person to manufacture, store, possess, handle, sell, use, launch or create a public display of any Explosive, Firework, Pyrotechnic, Rocket or Rocket Motors except in accordance with the California Fire Code Chapter 56, the San Bernardino County Code, the San Bernardino County Fire Protection District Fire Prevention Standards and any provision of any code or standard adopted or incorporated by reference by this Code.
 - (b) The storage of explosives and blasting agents is prohibited in residential

 areas, principal business districts, closely-built commercial areas and heavily-populated areas, except pursuant to California Fire Code Chapter 56 and as permitted by the San Bernardino County Sheriff's Department under Title 4, Division 5 of the San Bernardino County Code.

(c) Unless otherwise permitted, the possession, storage, use, sale and handling of any fireworks is prohibited within the County of San Bernardino and the District.

Exception: The possession, storage, sale, handling and use of specific types of approved fireworks may be allowed pursuant to local laws, ordinances and regulations within incorporated cities and towns of the County, provided such fireworks comply with California Code of Regulations, Title 19, and labeled "Safe and Sane" by the California State Fire Marshal.

- (d) The Fire Code Official and his designees are authorized to seize, take, remove or cause to be removed, at the expense of the owner, all stocks of fireworks, including but not limited to, Division 1.4G consumer fireworks, as classified pursuant to Title 49 Code of Federal Regulations, possessed, offered or exposed for sale, stored or held in violation of any state or local laws and ordinances.
- (e) The use of model and high-power rockets is prohibited within Wildfire Risk Areas as defined in San Bernardino County Fire Protection District Fire Code Section 202 (as amended) except as permitted by the San Bernardino County Fire Protection District.
- (f) Permits shall be required as set forth in San Bernardino County Fire Protection District Fire Code section 105.6.15 (as amended) and regulated in accordance with this section. Permits shall be obtained from the San Bernardino County Fire Protection District and the San Bernardino County Sheriff's Department in accordance with Title 4, Division 5, Chapter 2, Section 45.021 of the San Bernardino County Code to:

Possession of any type of fireworks, including "safe and sane" fireworks, is against the law in the City of Needles and the unincorporated areas of San Bernardino County. In the event a fire occurs due to the unsafe use of fireworks, the responsible persons may face criminal charges and be held liable for damages. In addition to fires, fireworks cause deaths, blindness, and maiming injuries to children and adults every year.

California Health and Safety Code 12677: Possess Dangerous Fireworks
